Since the occupation of Iraq, the christian community, the oldest community of the world, is facing attacks, murders and displacement problems that increased lately in the city of Mossul. These attacks against the minorities are a part from the suffering of Iraqi people. It is to note that around 7 millions Iraqis are displaced since the occupation of the country.

Prosecutions of the plaestinians in Iraq were intensified lately, and nowadays, the attacks are against the christians in iraq in order to displace them. It is a structured plan to destroy Iraq and divide it in order to let this new situation of division control the whole arab region and its people. Attacking the minorities, whether the christian or other, and attacking the iraqi civilian because of his religious or confessionnal belonging doesn't only attack the minorities, it also destroys the national, social and historical structure of the iraqi people and civilisation.

Minorities, whether in Iraq, Syria, Lebanon or Egypt, are the basis of national unity and stability. Minorities are the cultural and civilisatory wealth that distinguishes the region and that we should protect and be proud about.

Displacement started in Palestine, in Akka and Gaza for example, and it is still happening nowadays in Iraq and was happening in Lebanon... This is a plan of division and not a religious case affecting minorities.

The displacement could start with the minorities but its danger can affect the whole community, the regimes and the civilians.

Therefore, we stand today in front of the house of the United Nations condemning the displacement massacres that the christian Iraqis are suffering from. We express our solidarity with them, not because they are minorities or because they are christians, but because they are civilians whose rights and dignities are being violated in opposition with the articles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and all the other international conventions.

We organized this sit-in to express our solidarity with the christians of Iraq, with our civilians in Iraq and we condemn the international and arab silence towards there displacement. Protection should be provided for them from the iraqi government and the occupying american forces that bear the responsibilty of protecting the civilians according to Geneva Convention in 1949.

Attacking christians and non-christians because of their religion is an attack against the right to a free thinking, to have a religion, and to freely express the opinion. It is an attack against the right to live in freedom and in peace. It is an arbitrary interference in the private life of the families and the civilians.

Therefore, I urge you to interfere as soon as possible to protect the Iraqi christians and the iraqi people in general, to help the displaced to go back home and to punish everyone for the crimes he committed against the christians in Iraq. This will save the iraqi unity and defend the values of justice and human rights.
